Applied Field Methods (3-6 credits) in Environmental Science & Policy Culture & the Environment

In addition to the <u>ENSP386 (Internship)</u> and <u>ENSP499 (Honors Thesis Research)</u> options, students may opt to participate in research or field experiences offered through the Department of Anthropology.

ANTH467 - Researching Environment and Culture (Spring semesters)

The course is a project-based class where students learn methods and analysis to work on a real environmental anthropology research project (for example: what cultures eat vultures as bushmeat or use them for belief practices?)

ANTH495 – Advanced Field Training in Brazil (Summer term)

ANTH496 – Field Methods in Archaeology (Summer term)

This program is an archaeology field school credit. Archaeology students who complete a field school qualify to work in cultural resources management. The archaeologists who conduct surveys prior to road building or park designation, etc. There are 4 different archaeology field schools that fall into the ANTH496 category:

- Archaeology in Annapolis (and E. Shore),
- Forensic Aviation Archaeology (excavating WWII plane in Austria),
- Lattimer Archaeology Project (coal mining community of Hazelton, PA),
- Ireland's Early Modern Period (excavation in Ireland to look at post-Famine communities, Irish migration and diaspora).
